

Trends in Difficulty Meeting Basic Living Needs and Health Care Needs

The percentage of RCOS clients who have reported difficulty meeting basic living needs and health care needs at follow-up has decreased over time.





Clients were asked five items about their difficulty paying for basic living needs such as food, rent/mortgage, utilities, and telephone.



Clients were asked three items about their difficulty paying for medical care such as doctor visits, dental visits, and prescriptions.

ECONOMIC STRUGGLES AT FOLLOW-UP

Fewer recovery center clients reported having difficulty paying for basic or health care needs at follow-up in report years 2015 and 2016 compared to report year 2014.

individuals still reported difficulty paying for health care needs at follow-up
