
Ann Stowe, PhD, was elected as a Board Member for the International Society of Cerebral Blood Flow and Metabolism.

Dr. Baumann was nominated by Bethanie Morgan, MD:

"Few physicians in Kentucky can boast of practicing medicine for 50 years. Robert J. Baumann has not only practiced in the challenging field of child neurology in Kentucky for 50 years, but he was also key to establishing The Office for Children with Special Health Care Needs' (OCSHCN) network of regional medical clinics in eastern Kentucky. Since the 1970's, Baumann has been providing top-notch care for children with neurological disorders in these clinics and was the first director of the Regional Neurology Clinics.

After completing his neurology training at the University of Chicago, Baumann moved to Kentucky to begin his career. Baumann worked diligently to establish a network of child neurology clinics throughout Eastern Kentucky, visiting counly health departments one by one to extol the potential benefits that specialized neurological care could give to children with neurological conditions. He was instrumental in the establishment of six regional neurology clinics and multiple satellite clinics. Now, even with a busy schedule as professor and section chief of child neurology at the University of Kentucky, Baumann continues to provide care to children at the OCSHCN neurology clinics.

Baumann is a revered child neurologist not only in Kentucky, but also nationwide. In 2021, he received the Brumback Lifetime Achievement Award from the Child Neurology Society. He has served on numerous national boards and committees, including the National Institute of Health. In addition to these roles, he has authored 76 publications in medical literature. 
Teamwork:

The Vicarious Trauma Toolkit

The Vicarious Trauma Toolkit (VTT) was developed on the premise that exposure to the traumatic experiences of other people–known as vicarious trauma–is an inevitable occupational challenge for the fields of victim services, emergency medical services, fire services, law enforcement, and other allied professionals; however, organizations can mitigate the potentially negative effects of trauma exposure by becoming vicarious trauma-informed.
