Spotlight: Dr. Roberto Cardarelli

Dr. Roberto Cardarelli, DO, MHA, MPH was the former director of KAN, and has spent the past year as Chief Medical Officer (CMO) at Baptist Health Louisville. The system he oversees as CMO is a 490-bed hospital, which is ranked number three in Kentucky by the 2024-25 U.S. News & World Report Best Hospital Listings. The KAN team interviewed Dr. Cardarelli to ask about the rewards and opportunities of his role in executive leadership.

A clear driver behind his passion for this role was that it has allowed him to work on quality improvement and population health initiatives in several of his executive roles. Utilizing his love for data and research, Dr. Cardarelli described his work in developing the "Concentration Model", a structural and accountability approach to improving quality and safety outcomes. One example was his team's work around hospital mortality scores. In the short year he has been with Baptist Health, Dr. Cardarelli has played an integral part in redesigning and implementing the concentration model as it relates to this quality outcome. The result was elevating the hospital's mortality scores to above national benchmark and high performing

The concentration model's success is now being applied to other quality and safety health care metrics including length of stay and fall prevention. <u>Dr. Cardarelli's work</u> bridges research with daily hospital operations, making evidence-based frameworks actionable in acute care settings.

Beyond his role at Baptist Health, Dr. Cardarelli's long-standing engagement with practice-based research networks and KAN has continued, and he currently serves on our executive board. When asked, Dr. Cardarelli related what drives his engagement with KAN: "the innovation and commitment to advancing care delivery." Board work often centers on approving research proposals to assure they are not only meaningful for practicing physicians but also impactful for the communities they serve, something that Dr. Cardarelli is especially well suited to evaluate.

Looking to the future, Dr. Cardarelli sees immense potential for primary care physicians to play a central role in health systems and quality improvement research. Researchers, he emphasized, must acknowledge the significant barriers providers face, including their often-overwhelming administrative burden. KAN can play a part in this, providing opportunities that are aligned to address practice needs and to better understand and engage providers in meaningful research, quality improvement, and engagement in a community of practices.



Through his leadership, research, and commitment to quality improvement, Dr. Cardarelli continues to shape the future of healthcare by <u>integrating</u> <u>evidence-based strategies into real-</u> <u>world practice that can help ensure</u> <u>meaningful and lasting change in</u> <u>patient outcomes. We are grateful that</u> <u>he brings his significant expertise to</u> <u>the decision-making of our KAN</u> <u>board</u>. Who are we and what do we do?

The KAN Board, consisting of eight dedicated members, plays a crucial role in ensuring that all network activities align with our mission. This is accomplished through the careful review, approval, or disapproval of research proposals that seek to utilize KAN resources. Each board member serves on a voluntary basis, contributing their time and expertise to uphold the integrity and mission of the network. Notably, our longest-serving board member, Gerry Stover, joined soon after its creation in 2000 and has been an integral part of KAN, demonstrating the commitment and dedication that define our leadership.

Any research study included in KAN newsletters or disseminated to our members undergoes a thorough evaluation process. Each submission is carefully reviewed, discussed, and approved by the KAN Board to ensure quality and relevance to primary care providers. This vetting process typically takes place soon after a research collaboration request is received and initially screened by KAN Director, Dr. Karen Roper.

KAN does not impose a fixed limit on the size of our board and is **always eager to welcome new members** who share our commitment to research and collaboration.

In addition to established professionals, we actively seek to fill two to four trainee board positions. The KAN board, along with a <u>recent study</u> on the topic, has expressed that too few trainees realize that PBRNs exist and/or could aid them as they seek opportunities to advance their research or quality improvement project interests, and in doing this – their careers! 


