PROGRAMS OF THE CENTER

Healthy WAY

Empowering Youth to Create Solutions

Healthy WAY began as a pilot initiative called Healthalachia, a student-based research initiative used to engage high school teams in identifying an issue within their school. Each team was required to have students, school staff and community members. Student teams were provided funding for their project and technical support as they implemented them. The initiative was a joint partnership between the University of



Kentucky Center of Excellence in Rural Health (UK CERH) and the Kentucky Valley Educational Cooperative (KVEC). Feedback related to the Healthalachia pilot was so positive that UK CERH has formalized the project, rebranded, made updates based on feedback from pilot student groups, and implemented Healthy WAY as a Center program.

Healthy WAY encourages student-led teams to work collectively on an identified problem by reviewing local data, trends, and research to develop a strategic plan of action with key stakeholders in their schools and communities.

This is a competitive process requiring each high school student group to complete a request for proposal. Three projects were selected from the Kentucky Appalachian counties. Each selected student group was awarded \$1,000 to implement their project. Schools are expected to be the fiscal agent for the award. Selected student groups participate in a workshop designed to help them identify resources and skills to enhance their proposals.

The UK CERH provides monthly check-ins with each group and a mid-point in-person meeting. Staff are also available for any questions or issues that arise. Student groups are expected to present their research at events hosted by the UK CERH.

2019 Selected Projects

"Clean Air- Healthy Mouth, Lungs and Heart" (Buckhorn High School)

Addressing student use of tobacco and vaping products and its impact on the health of all students and faculty.

"Lived United" (Somerset Christian School)

Working with Operation UNITE, the students will put together a one-day workshop to share with a group of Pulaski County High School students. Substance misuse education and prevention will be the focus.

"Awesome Panthers" (Pikeville High School)

The students will look at the pros and cons of the current School Safety and Prevention Plan and work with others to make them strong so that they feel, and actually are, safer should a situation arise.

The UK Center of Excellence in Rural Health serves as the federally-designated Kentucky Office of Rural Health (KORH). The KORH serves as a resource for clinicians, students, community leaders, state agencies and legislators for Kentucky Office of Rural Health information about rural health issues. The KORH works to promote the improvement of rural health care through

partnerships with public and private entities statewide and at the regional and national levels. This program provides a framework for linking small rural communities with local, state and federal resources while working toward long-term solutions to rural health issues. KORH programs are funded primarily through HRSA's Federal Office of Rural Health Policy under the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services as well as through other state and federal agencies; including a 3:1 match support from the UK CERH.

KORH Programs

KORH is pleased to administer the following programs in Kentucky:

Small Rural Hospital Improvement Grant Program

In 2019, the Small Rural Hospital Improvement Grant Program (SHIP) supported 35 of Kentucky's small rural hospitals in the areas of Value Based Purchasing, Accountable Care Organizations, and Payment Bundling/PPS (ICD-10).

Kentucky State Loan Repayment Program

During 2019, the Kentucky State Loan Repayment Program (KSLRP) supported 33 providers located in 24 rural or underserved counties across the Commonwealth. The 2019-2020 application window closed October 1, 2019 with 45 additional providers submitting applications.

Rural Hospital Flexibility Program

Kentucky's Rural Hospital Flexibility (Flex) Grant Program endeavors to stabilize the smallest and most vulnerable rural hospitals and to improve access to hospital-based care for rural populations. During 2019, the Flex program continued to provide support to Kentucky's 27 Critical Access Hospitals (CAHs) and the communities they serve. As part of the Flex program, KORH was awarded funding for the Kentucky EMS Sustainability Project and the Committed to the Heart Initiative.

Kentucky EMS Sustainability Project

The FY 2018-2019 Flex EMS Sustainability Project's administrative supplement funding to the Medicare Rural Hospital Flexibility (Flex) Grant Program provided additional funding to states for one year to support in-depth technical assistance to rural EMS systems. The purpose of this award was to fund projects to build an evidence base for sustainable rural EMS models and use results from these projects to inform future Flex program direction and disseminate information about successful models to rural EMS stakeholders. This program ended on August 31, 2019.

Committed to the Heart Initiative-Flex EMS Supplemental Funding

Through a competitive application process, Kentucky was selected as one of eight recipients to receive a 3-year supplemental Flex funding award (2019-2022) targeted to improve access to quality emergency medical care in rural communities. This supplemental funding is expected to assist in addressing the challenges faced by rural EMS agencies, while contributing to the rural EMS evidence base. Our proposal was centered on the phased rollout of CARES (Cardiac Arrest Registry to Enhance Survival) as well as increasing bystander CPR at the community level and AED registry promotion among targeted communities. The project will specifically focus on improving out-of-hospital sudden cardiac arrest rates among those rural counties served by one of the state's 27 designated Critical Access Hospitals.

National Health Service Corps Promotion Project

The National Health Service Corps (NHSC) is a competitive Federal program that awards scholarships to students in return for a commitment to provide care in underserved communities.

The program pays tuition and fees and provides a living stipend to students enrolled in accredited medical (M.D. or D.O.), dental, nurse practitioner, certified nurse midwife, or physician assistant training. By way of contract with the Kentucky Primary Care Office, the KORH continues to provide technical assistance to clinicians and facilities across Kentucky in regards to the promotion of the NHSC programs as well as promote the programs of the NHSC to the community at large.

KORH in the Community

Through the provision of direct and indirect technical assistance, coordination of rural health resources as well as through the dissemination of rural relevant information, the KORH is continually engaged with the community in every aspect of its work.

The mission of the KORH is to support the health and well-being of Kentuckians by promoting access to rural health services. The program provides a framework for linking small rural communities with local, state, and federal resources while working toward long-term solutions to rural health issues. The KORH assists clinicians, administrators and consumers to find ways to improve communications, finances and access to quality health care while insuring that funding agencies and policy makers are made aware of the needs of rural communities.

Information Dissemination

The KORH Weekly Update, a composition of rural health news, announcements, educational offerings, and funding opportunities is released each Monday morning. The KORH Weekly Update experienced an 8% increase in subscribers during 2019.

The Bridge debuted in January 2015. This quarterly publication focuses on rural health issues and topics pertaining to the Commonwealth, while spotlighting individuals and programs that exemplify innovation or excellence in Kentucky's rural health landscape. The magazine is a collaborative project between the UK Center of Excellence in Rural Health and the KORH.

2020 Outlook

The KORH continues to develop programmatic activities based on the needs of rural stakeholders within the guidelines of funders. The goal of maintaining adequate funding for KORH programs amidst the changing political environment remains an area of constant focus. The KORH continues to explore additional opportunities in order to effectively broaden programming while remaining true to the original mission and purpose.

Kentucky Homeplace



Funding for the program is a joint collaboration of the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services and the University of Kentucky and the Center of Excellence in Rural Health.



Kentucky Homeplace is recognized at the national, state and local levels as a Community Health Worker (CHW) model that works. Residents of rural Kentucky have unusually high levels of certain diseases, including cancer, heart disease, hypertension, asthma, and diabetes. Lifestyle choices, environmental factors, inadequate health insurance and general lack of understanding of the healthcare system are often cited as contributing factors. To help address these issues, Kentucky Homeplace began in 1994 as a demonstration project in 14 Appalachian counties. After more than two decades, Kentucky Homeplace CHWs have linked tens of thousands of rural Kentuckians with medical, social and environmental services they otherwise might have gone without. Today, Kentucky Homeplace's geographic service area includes 30 Appalachian counties in eastern Kentucky. Eligibility for Kentucky Homeplace is not based on income, though nearly all clients are between 100% - 133% of the federal poverty level. All services are offered at no charge to the clients.

Medicaid and KCHIP Assisters

Kentucky Homeplace CHWs are trained to assist individuals with Medicaid and Kentucky Children's Health Insurance Program (KCHIP) enrollment and coverage renewals. CHWs serve as an integral resource to help individuals navigate the health coverage process by providing educational services and application support. During the 2019 fiscal year, CHWs assisted 209 individuals with enrollments and renewals in Medicaid and KCHIP.

Community-Based Programs

Community health workers are trained to facilitate community-based health education and coaching workshops to assist people with chronic illness to achieve improvements in nutrition, medication use, exercise, communication, decision-making and more.

Walk with Ease

Developed by the Thurston Arthritis Research Center and the Institute on Aging of the University of North Carolina, the Walk With Ease (WWE) program can be experienced on your own or with a group. Comprehensive studies demonstrate that WWE reduces pain, increases balance and strength and improves your overall health. The Arthritis Foundation's six-week WWE program can teach individuals how to safely make physical activity part of their everyday life. Classes are taught by Kentucky Homeplace CHWs who are trained as WWE leaders.

Chronic Disease Self-Management Program

Kentucky Homeplace community health workers are trained as lay leaders in the Chronic Disease Self-Management Program (CDSMP) developed by Stanford University. Small group education workshops are conducted for six weeks, meeting once a week for 2 ½ hours per session. Classes are highly participatory. Mutual support and success builds participants' confidence in their ability to manage their health and maintain active and fulfilling lives. Kentucky Homeplace CHWs are also cross-trained in the Diabetes Self-Management Program (DSMP).

Funding for both the CDSMP and WWE programs is a joint collaboration of the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services in conjunction with a grant from the Centers for Disease Control and the UK Center of Excellence in Rural Health.

"I have had diabetes for 10 years now and have struggled with what I can eat and when I can eat it. My physician told me to go talk to a dietitian but I had no way to get there and no money to pay someone to take me 30 miles from home and wait all day for me to get finished. This class has taught me more than I have ever learned. It has helped me learn how to better count from labels and I find myself trying harder to monitor everything that goes in my mouth and how it affects my glucose readings. This has been the best thing I could have ever taken."

2020 Outlook

Kentucky Homeplace will continue efforts to obtain sustainable funding in order to meet their mission to provide access to medical, social, and environmental services for the citizens of the Commonwealth. CHWs will continue to provide education, coaching, and services with the goal of improving the health of their clients.



WellCare and Kentucky Homeplace Partnership

WellCare partnered with Kentucky Homeplace and its community health workers between 12/30/2016 and 12/20/2018 to implement a pilot program focused on improving access to health care for rural Kentucky residents. The program utilized 22 Kentucky Homeplace CHWs, who are trained as lay leaders in the Chronic Disease Self-Management Program as well as the Diabetes Self-Management Program, to deliver health coaching workshops focused on preventive care and chronic disease self-management. Individuals diagnosed with a chronic condition, such as asthma, diabetes, high blood pressure, and obesity, who were WellCare members, and resided within Kentucky Homeplace's 30-county service area were selected to participate in the program. For six weeks, participants met weekly with a CHW and received educational workshops on nutrition, medication use, exercise, communication, decision-making, and more. Participants received a \$10 gas card each week to help remove transportation barriers.



Outcomes

On October 3, 2019, WellCare and Kentucky Homeplace shared the results of their rural health research partnership. During the press event, Dr. Feltner, UK CERH Director, Mace Baker, Kentucky

Homeplace Director, Ben Orris, WellCare of Kentucky COO, and the Kentucky Homeplace CHWS celebrated the success of the program. Overall, healthcare utilization decreased with ER visits, including non-emergency visits, and inpatients admission both declining. These results show promise that individuals can better manage their chronic conditions by receiving health coaching from a trusted provider and removing barriers to access.

Goals and Initiatives

The UK CERH's "Excellence in Action" team has been committed to implementing the strategic plan and goals set forth in July 2017.

Learning Community: The academic programs collaborate on interdisciplinary opportunities for students at the Center, with positive feedback from the students regarding these events. Recruitment continues to be a focus for the programs. The academic committee has monthly contact to ensure open communication and to address any challenges faced by the programs.

Research Environment: Research continued to be a primary focus in 2019. The external and internal research teams are working to engage students in Center research and continue implementing a research project selection process. Identifying and establishing the Center's role in research partnerships with community agencies has been part of the focus for 2019.

Work Environment: Communication continues to improve, which helps foster a positive work environment and strengthens the Center's infrastructure. Efforts to identify employees' interest in potential projects and tapping into their skillsets has helped assign projects.

Commonwealth and the Community: Our community outreach efforts continue to be a priority. The Center has reached out to other health related agencies and coalitions and has taken the lead in coordinating efforts in projects. In addition, in 2019, the Center reached out to rural communities in Western Kentucky to develop partnerships and provide support.

Infrastructure: The UK CERH Facebook page has grown from 930 page likes to 1,291 in the past year. Using social media, the Center is able to inform and educate more individuals at the local, state and national levels about our work. In addition, our Center staff/faculty increased the number of presentations to 46 (8 international) at conferences. Space continues to be evaluated to ensure needs are meet.

Academic Committee

Purpose: Identify needs of the academic programs at the Center and develop plans/recommendations to promote meeting these needs.

Duties:

Policy Committee

Purpose: Create, communicate and maintain the policies and procedures of the UK CERH. Duties:

- Yearly review of policies to ensure still relevant and/or up-to-date to UK CERH needs.
- Develop UK CERH specific policies and procedures needed to address administrative, business or HR processes.
- Dissemination of policies and procedure changes/updates to supervisors and make available to individual employees.
- Communicate with supervisors about other external policies (accrediting sources, research requirements, etc.) influencing the Center and department/program functioning.
- Communicate with our partners any policy updates/changes that may affect working relationship.

Safety Committee

Purpose: Address safety issues of employees, students and guest at the UK CERH.

Duties:

- Annually review and update the Building Emergency Action Plan (BEAP) Manual.
- Draft new policy protocols related to safety and forward to policy committee for input and approval.
- Conduct emergency drills per protocol and train floor leaders as needed.
- Address problems made known to the committee (i.e. sidewalks, lights etc.).
- Ensure all personnel have evacuated the building or have reached the assigned safety areas within the building during drills or actual emergencies.

- As needed, serve in an advisory capacity to support UK CERH units in conceptualizing and/ or developing content and messaging for marketing and promotional materials.




THE BRIDGE


The Bridge targets health care providers, educators, researchers, leaders, community members and others who work in the rural health care arena or have interest in rural health issues, innovations and best practices.




The Bridge has an annual outreach of approximately 7,500.

Expected Job Growth

Employment of medical laboratory technologists and technicians is projected to grow 11 percent from 2018 to 2028, much faster than the average for all occupations. An increase in the aging population is expected to lead to a greater need to diagnose medical conditions, such as cancer or type 2 diabetes, through laboratory procedures. Doctor of Physical Therapy

According to the American Physical Therapy Association website (www.apta.org), "Physical therapists (PTs) are highly-educated, licensed health care professionals who can help patients reduce pain and improve or restore mobility - in many cases without expensive surgery and often reducing the need for long-term use of prescription medications and their side effects. Physical therapists can teach patients how to prevent or manage their condition so that they will achieve longterm health benefits. PTs examine each individual and develop a plan, using treatment techniques to promote the ability to move, reduce pain, restore function, and prevent disability. In addition, PTs work with individuals to prevent the loss of mobility before it occurs by developing fitness- and wellness-oriented programs for healthier and more active lifestyles."

"I wish there were enough words to describe the positive impact that the UKDPT program at the Hazard Campus has had on me. I've never been in an environment that fosters learning as much as this one. The professors are ALWAYS available and are here until 9pm sometimes just to make sure we fully grasp the content and truly follow the open-door policy. Overall employment of social workers is projected to grow 11 percent from 2018 to 2028. Increased demand for healthcare and social services will drive demand for social workers, but growth will vary by specialization. 




CLIK is a leadership development training program offered by the UK Center of Excellence in Rural Health, the Kentucky Office of Rural Health, and the UK CCTS Community Engagement and Research Program. Kentucky Appalachian Rural Rehabilitation Network

The Kentucky Appalachian Rural Rehabilitation Network (KARRN) is a statewide network of people with spinal cord injury (SCI), stroke, and brain injury (TBI), healthcare providers, educators, researchers, and other community members committed to the health and well-being of people with neurological impairments who live in the Appalachian region. The KARRN network continually engages



community members and conducts research in the areas of SCI, TBI and stroke. Each year, the network holds an annual conference, which provides CEUs for physicians, nurses, social workers, physical therapists, occupational therapists, and speech therapists. In addition, KARRN helps provides assistance with the Kentucky Congress on Spinal Cord Injury Conference.

In 2019, KARRN celebrated its 10th annual conference and has continued its commitment to the health and well-being of individuals with disabilities. Work continues with community partners to develop the Kentucky Appalachian Assistive and Rehabilitation Technology Center (KAART).

The UK CERH is a long-standing partner of the network. Under the umbrella of KARRN are Project CARAT (Coordinating and Assisting the Reuse of Assistive Technology) and the KAART Center.

Project CARAT

Project Carat is a community outreach, service learning program that aims to make assistive technology and durable medical equipment more accessible to those who need it in underserved areas of Kentucky. The UK CERH and Carl D. Perkins Center were the original sites for Project CARAT. The UK CERH site is unique in that it is a service learning program and ran by Physical Therapy students. Students are trained to clean and refurbish DME to distribute to those in need.



Project CARAT has several locations across Kentucky and is now overseen by the Kentucky Assistive Technology Service Network (KATS).

Physical Therapy students (UK CERH Campus) held an equipment drive in downtown Hazard, KY. They received around 20 pieces of equipment and WYMT covered the event.

Stroke Survivor and Caregiver Stroke Support Group

The Stroke Survivor and Caregiver Stroke Support Group is the first group of its kind in Perry County to offer support for stroke survivors and caregivers. The group welcomes individuals from Perry and surrounding counties. It was established in 2015 as part of the Kentucky Care Coordination for Community Transitions pilot program and is registered with the National Stroke Association. The stroke support group is very active in the community conducting educational campaigns, providing stroke risk screenings, creating public service announcements, and many other activities.

In 2019, the support group succeeded in getting the month of May declared as Stroke Awareness Month again in Perry County and the City of Hazard with Perry County Judge Executive, Scott Alexander, and Hazard Mayor, Happy Mobelini, signing the Stroke Awareness Month proclamation. In addition to Perry County and the City of Hazard, this year the group added proclamations from Buckhorn Mayor Thomas Burns, Knott County Judge Executive Jeff Dobson, and Letcher County Judge Executive Terry Adams. In May 2019, Stroke Awareness Month, the support group educated 601 students.

Throughout 2019, the group was able to educate 179 adults on stroke prevention, signs, and symptoms. The group also hosted a lunch-and-learn at the Center to promote World Stroke Day on October 29. There were 50 people in attendance that received stroke education. Local news station WYMT covered the event.





Operation Change

Operation Change is a unique 18-week community-based behavioral health program targeting underserved women experiencing obesity, joint pain and limited mobility.

Operation Change provides motivational interview training to women in the local community who help execute the program. The program integrates structured physical activity



with culturally-tailored patient education into each weekly session that concludes with small group discussions led by motivational interviewers who help participants identify and address barriers to positive change.

This was the first Operation Change program implemented in a rural community. The ladies loved it so much they wanted to continue meeting. The UK CERH has agreed to host a monthly meetings with all of the participants.

Operation Change is a joint collaboration between Movement is Life and the University of Kentucky Center of Excellence in Rural Health.

Area Health Education Center Health Career Enrichment Camp

Health Career Enrichment Camp is a two-week, hands-on day camp that introduces incoming freshman and sophomore high school students to a variety of health careers. It is designed to provide a unique learning opportunity to motivate, encourage, and spark an interest in a student to further their education and pursue a career in the evergrowing and advancing field of healthcare. The annual camp is held at the UK Center of Excellence in Rural Health and is co-hosted in partnership with the Southeast Kentucky Area Health Education Center (AHEC).



Scrubs Camp

In June 2019, the Southeast KY AHEC /Highlands Regional Medical Center Scrubs Camp group visited the UK CERH. Students were introduced to a variety of health careers, interacted with healthcare professionals, participated in a variety of hands-on activities, and toured the UK CERH.







Students Striving Toward Better Health in Self and Community Initiative

United Healthcare (UHC) and the UK Center of Excellence in Rural Health announced a grant to support the first-ever Students Striving Toward Better Health in Self and Community initiative, available to Perry County and Hazard Independent high school students.

Students enrolling in the program will receive tuition-free education and training for the community health worker certification. UK CERH will be the lead in the development, coordination and execution of content and programming with UHC providing expertise and support resources. The community health worker (CHW) curriculum is based on the Kentucky Homeplace training model and is built upon Kentucky Homeplace's 25-years of community health worker experience. Classes will be conducted onsite at Hazard Community and Technical College.

The pilot program presents a unique, first-inclass partnership that demonstrates how private business, higher education and communities are addressing rural health and opportunity in Kentucky together. The grant for \$35,000 will cover costs for 23 students, include a United Healthcare virtual mentor internship and a paid apprenticeship.

Classes are set to start in January 2020.












Diabetes Coalitions

The Center helped community members in Perry, Knott and Leslie counties secure funding through Marshall University. Upon initial award of the funding, the Center staff acted as an advisor for each coalition. The coalitions have now transitioned to community members in each county. Each coalition is made up of a group of concerned community members—professionals, people with diabetes, family members, and others—who raise awareness of diabetes and provide education on diabetes prevention and effective management.











Kentucky River Health Consortium

The mission of the Consortium is to use our collective expertise and resources to address the health burdens in the Kentucky River counties of Breathitt, Knott, Letcher, Leslie, Lee, Owsley, Perry, and Wolfe. The Center initiated the



development of the consortium and continues to take a leading role in moving the group forward. Melissa Slone, UK CERH Research Inter-disciplinary Director, serves as Chair for the consortium.

The motivation is to allow for information sharing and discussions on how to work collectively and offer expertise in identifying local health concerns, barriers and access to some of the region's most prevalent health threats.

Together we are stronger; our resources and talents can be combined to move the healthcare needle in a more positive direction for our Kentucky River counties.

An example of this is when several of our partner agencies/programs applied and received grant funding for: "The Kentucky River Community United for Restoring Resilience and Empowerment" (KyR-CURRE).

- Primary goal is for community partners to come together and develop the tools, skills and strategies to aggressively reduce the morbidity and mortality associated with opioid use disorder (OUD).
- Purpose is to support prevention, treatment for and recovery of substance use disorder, including OUD, in KRADD counties.





Kentucky Rural Health Association Conference

For the second year, the UK CERH hosted the poster session at the Kentucky Rural Health Association (KRHA) annual conference held on November 14-15, 2019 in Bowling Green, Kentucky. In addition to sharing their research and outcomes, participants were also required to discuss the potential policy impact of their work. Judges, from various fields and agencies, provided scoring and feedback on the fourteen posters accepted. During lunch, poster winners were announced by Melissa Slone, UK CERH Research Inter-disciplinary Director.




CDC's "Tips from Former Smokers Campaign




Darkness to Light Training
