



Dr. Farr's research in developmental psychology focuses on diverse families, particularly those parented by LGBTQ+ adults and formed through adoption. For over 14 years, she has conducted a large longitudinal study about how parental sexual orientation relates to child, parent, and family outcomes among diverse adoptive families across the U.S. Funded by the William T. Grant Foundation, Dr. Farr is currently studying racially, socioeconomically, and geographically diverse adolescents with LGBTQ+ parents.

20 Years Since the Landmark IOM "Unequal Treatment" Report

STAT News has released a two-part report discussing progress on addressing health disparities in the United States, 20 years after the landmark Institute of Medicine Report, "Unequal Treatment" was released.

"<u>Unequal Treatment</u>" was the first major report to point to longstanding systemic racism — not poverty, lack of access to health care, or other social factors — as a major reason for the nation's deeply entrenched health disparities. The authors, a blue-ribbon panel of the National Academies' Institute of Medicine, hoped their work would kickstart a national discussion and lead to much-needed change...

But today, the disparities — poorer outcomes and higher death rates for nearly every medical condition the panel examined — and the structural racism underlying them, remain. That grim truth has been made startlingly clear by both the pandemic and by statistics that show Black Americans continue to die <u>up to five years earlier</u> than those who are white."
