As part of CHET's speaker series and in observance of National Minority Health Month in April, Dr. Aurora Santiago Ortiz will provide a talk entitled, "Collaboration Within Participatory Action Research: Challenges, Possibilities, and New Directions."

Aurora Santiago Ortiz is a Social Justice Education scholar and Lyman T. Johnson Postdoctoral Fellow at the University of Kentucky. Her research focuses on antiracist feminisms, decolonial



perspectives, popular education, and participatory action research. She holds a Ph.D. from the University of Massachusetts Amherst, a Juris Doctor from the University of Puerto Rico's School of Law, and a B.F.A. in Film and T.V. from NYU's Tisch School of the Arts. Her work has been published in the *Michigan Journal for Community Service Learning, Tracce Urbane: Italian Journal of Urban Studies*, and in *Chicana/Latina Studies Journal*. She has also been a contributor to *Society and Space, NACLA*, *The Abusable Past* blog of the *Radical History Review, Electric Marronage, Open Democracy,* and *Zora* magazine. She is also a co-founder and member of the community organization Cayey Urban Hub Collective.

Structural racism refers to the public and private policies, institutional practices, norms and cultural representations that inherently procure opportunity, value, advantage or disadvantage to individuals and populations according to their race/ethnicity both across the life course and between generations. The Committee on Population will convene a two-day public workshop to identify and discuss the sources and mechanisms through which structural racism operates. Invited experts will not only provide insights into known sources of structural racism and models of health equity, but also go beyond these to discuss novel sources and approaches, informed by other disciplines or related fields.
