Message from the Director

The University of Kentucky College of Medicine's Center of Excellence in Rural Health (UK CERH) is happy to share the 2022-year of "Excellence in Action". The report includes highlights from each of our community service programs, academic programs, research reports, publications, and community engagement efforts across rural Kentucky. Our work with rural communities across the Commonwealth allows eastern and western rural counties to work collectively to identify gaps in service, impact health equity, and increase access to health and social care. These activities are key to improving the health and wellbeing of Kentucky.



The year 2022 has met many challenges. The pandemic has continued to impact how we implement services in the community and how our employees interact in the work environment. Then heavy rain between July 25th and July 30th, 2022, brought deadly flash flooding, and devastating river flooding to eastern Kentucky and central Appalachia. Overwhelming amounts of rain and resultant flooding led to 43 deaths including two additional people dying from health complications. One person is still missing.

Widespread catastrophic damage affected many individuals, families, businesses, health care providers and their facilities. Flood waters led to costly damage to infrastructure in the region. Most of Eastern Kentucky lost electricity, water, internet and many secondary roads and bridges became impassible. Our community outreach was refocused as all employees and community partners assisted our employees, students, and community members affected by the flooding with the basic life necessities. Despite these challenges, our team of excellence kept projects moving forward and even grew and developed programs as needs were identified.

Empowering youth to create solutions through our newest program "Healthy Wellness in All Youth" (WAY) to provide leadership development and research training for rural Kentucky high school students. The program provides students with skills to identify and develop solutions to health and social issues at the school and community level. Congratulations to our six 2022 graduates!

Our Kentucky Office of Rural Health has provided support for and worked directly with providers, clinics, hospital administrators, policy makers, and other stakeholders to improve access to care during another pandemic year. They also added a new program in 2022, the Rural Veterans Health Access Program (RVHAP). The goal of this program is to increase services to improve health care for Kentucky's rural veterans.

Message from the Director

The Kentucky Homeplace program reached 5,019 underserved clients, provided 49,130 care coordination services to reduce the social determinants of health, and accessed medical supplies and medications valued at \$13,472,507 (July 1, 2021 – June 30, 2022). Kentucky Homeplace community outreach was refocused in August and September as our community health workers were assisting their clients affected by the flooding with the basic life necessities, access to medical supplies, and access to social and health care.

The College of Medicine East Kentucky Family Residency Program trains residents to meet the unique demands of a rural practice and provide quality care in rural settings. A total of 105 graduates from the program now provide access to health care.

The College of Health Science Doctor of Physical Therapy and Bachelor of Health Science with a Major in Medical Laboratory Science program continue providing graduates with the skills and knowledge to meet the workforce needs in rural Kentucky.

Appalachian Community Health Days continued working with our outreach team and community partners throughout 30 Eastern Kentucky counties and two West Virginia counties. These events bring services to hard to reach people who need access to preventative screenings and positive messaging to move from vaccine hesitancy to vaccine confidence. A special thank you to all our community partners in completing 90 events.

I hope you enjoy reading the 2022 "Excellence in Action" Annual Report. Thank you everyone! Together with our University of Kentucky, State, Nation, and most of all, our community partnerships, we will strive to improve the health and well-being of Kentucky.

The UK Center of Excellence in Rural Health serves as the federally-designated Kentucky Office of Rural Health (KORH). KORH serves as a resource for clinicians, students, community leaders, state agencies and legislators for information about rural health issues. KORH works to promote the improvement of

rural health care through partnerships with public and private entities statewide and at the regional and national levels. This program provides a framework for linking small rural communities with local, state and federal resources while working toward long-term solutions to rural health issues. KORH programs are funded primarily through HRSA's Federal Office of Rural Health Policy under the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services as well as through other state and federal agencies; including a 3:1 match support from the UK CERH.

KORH Programs

KORH is pleased to administer the following programs :

State Office of Rural Health Program

The State Office of Rural Health (SORH) encompasses programs that serve to strengthen health care delivery systems and improve health care access in rural areas of Kentucky. SORHs have a core charge of providing technical assistance to rural health organizations, information dissemination of rural relevant information to key stakeholders and rural health entities, and providing COORDINATION efforts for rural health activities to reduce duplication.

Small Rural Hospital Improvement Grant Program

Supports 46 of Kentucky's small rural hospitals (49 beds or less) by coordinating activities aimed to, improve data collection for reports, boost quality outcomes, make everyone accountable across the continuum of care, and maintain accurate Prospective System billing and coding.

American Rescue Plan (ARP) COVID-19 Testing and Mitigation Program

The SHIP COVID-19 Testing and Mitigation initiative provided one-time funding to support hospitals for testing education, establishment of alternate testing sites, test result processing, arranging for the processing of test results, and engaging in other activities within the CDC Community Mitigation Framework to address COVID-19 in rural communities. The KORH was awarded \$12,143,672 in funding to provide support to the projects of 47 participating Kentucky hospitals.

Kentucky State Loan Repayment Program

Through SLRP each state and territory can design programs that address the most pressing health care needs of their residents. Primary medical, mental/behavioral, and dental clinicians who receive awards through SLRP-funded programs pay off their student debt in exchange for working in areas with provider shortages.

New in 2022 the Kentucky Behavioral Health Workforce Initiative (KBHWI) is designed to help alleviate the growing shortage of Behavioral Health Professionals practicing in Kentucky. The initiative is supported with funds from the Kentucky State Loan Repayment Program.

Health Equity in Underserved Populations Across the Commonwealth of Kentucky Promotion Project

Beginning 2022, KORH will partner with The Cabinet for Health and Family Services (CHFS), Kentucky Department for Public Health (KDPH), Office of Health Equity (OHE) to provide outreach and technical assistance surrounding a funding opportunity designed to ensure that all marginalized and vulnerable populations receive equitable access to healthcare services to optimize Kentuckian's health outcomes and reduce healthcare system barriers. Barriers to optimal care may be mitigated by understanding co-morbidity exacerbation, and other social determinants of health that impact health outcomes through education, outreach, and community engagement using best practices and evidenced based tools and interventions, with the intent of improving overall health outcomes across the Commonwealth.



Rural Hospital Flexibility Program

A cornerstone of KORH, Kentucky's Rural Hospital Flexibility (Flex) Grant Program seeks to stabilize the smallest and most vulnerable rural hospitals and to improve access to hospital-based care for rural populations. The purpose of this cooperative agreement is to enable state Flex programs to support critical access hospital (CAHs) in the areas of quality improvement, quality reporting, performance improvement, and benchmarking; to assist facilities seeking designation as a CAH; and to create a program to establish or expand the provision of rural EMS. During 2022, the Flex program continued to provide support to Kentucky's 28 CAHs and the communities they serve.

Committed to the Heart Initiative—Flex EMS Supplemental Funding

Through a competitive application process, Kentucky was selected as one of eight recipients to receive a three-year supplemental Flex funding award (2019-2022) targeted to improve access to quality emergency medical care in rural communities. This supplemental funding is expected to assist in addressing the challenges faced by rural EMS agencies, while contributing to the rural EMS evidence base. KORH's proposal was centered on the phased rollout of CARES (Cardiac Arrest Registry to Enhance Survival) as well as increasing bystander CPR at the community level and AED registry promotion among targeted communities. The project will specifically focus on improving out-of-hospital sudden cardiac arrest rates among those rural counties served by one of the state's 28 designated Critical Access Hospitals.

National Health Service Corps

KORH is under contract with the Kentucky Primary Care Office to promote the federal National Health Service Corps (NHSC) programs and provide technical assistance to clinicians, students and facilities across Kentucky applying for and participating in those programs. NHSC programs offer scholarship support to health professions students and loan repayment awards to clinicians as a way to encourage service in communities with limited access to health care.

Kentucky RHC Initiative

KORH continues to serve as a trusted resource for Kentucky Rural Health Clinics (RHC). The KORH facilitates the Kentucky RHC Summit, regional RHC networks, peer-to-peer consultations, coordinates educational opportunities, mock surveys, and offers scholarships for national meetings related to RHC performance. KORH staff are well-informed of changes in RHC policy, reimbursement and compliance and share applicable information by way of a dedicated RHC list serve.



Kentucky EMS Leadership Academy

Now in it's third year, the Kentucky EMS Leadership Academy is designed to provide the Commonwealth's EMS professionals with the knowledge and skills necessary to help them succeed in leadership roles—now and in the future. The academy combines interactive, webinar-based training sessions with one-on-one mentoring from veteran EMS administrators.

Elder Wellness Enrichment Initiative

KORH's Elder Wellness Enrichment Initiative provides funding of up to nonprofit rural health care organizations or community-based organizations to create or enhance services for older adults – to help them age in place in rural Kentucky. Projects were required to be conducted in collaboration with at least one of the following rural stakeholders located in an applicant's community or region: a critical access hospital, a small rural hospital, a rural health clinic, a federally qualified health center, a local health department or an EMS service.

Kentucky Rural Funders Initiative

Launched in 2022, activities include Finding Funding in Kentucky- A monthly webinar series that offers an inside look at funding agencies that support rural health projects in Kentucky and the development of the Kentucky Rural Health Funders Network.

Rural Emergency Hospital (REH) Designation Outreach

Newly funded as a supplement to the 22-23 Flex grant, KORH has been commissioned to provide REH education and outreach across the Commonwealth. The KORH will partner with Wintergreen who has developed a focused educational series on the REH designation as well as an in-depth financial impact assessment for individual hospitals that can be utilized as a practical, in-state "case study" to build out the educational curriculum to augment Wintergreen's didactic resources and facilitate outreach efforts. Our approach is a blend of general education as well as individual REH case studies that will function as vignettes for the broader Kentucky CAH community.

Rural Veterans Health Access Program (RVHAP)

Launched in 2022, this program provides funding to states to work with providers and other partners to improve access to needed health care services and to improve the coordination of care for veterans living in rural areas. Award recipients can implement a variety of strategies to improve the capacity of critical access hospitals and other rural health care organizations to provide services that meet the needs of veterans living in rural areas. Award recipients can also assist providers in making connections to the Department of Veterans Affairs system to coordinate care for rural veterans using community health care providers as well as the VA system.

Expanding Health Care Access for Rural Veterans Project

Funds innovative projects that seek to create, enhance, or increase services that are intended to improve health care for Kentucky's rural veterans.



Awards Presented

Kentucky Rural Health Clinic Impact Award

The annual award is presented during the Kentucky RHC Summit. Award recipients are selected based on their unselfishness, compassion and cooperative attitude in seeking ways to make lasting contributions to bettering rural health care. Their work should expand beyond the local community and have a demonstrated effect on rural health at state and national levels. This includes, but is not limited to, contributions to rural health policy, legislation, health care and health programs.

Elsie Crawford, the vice president of operations and director of nursing at the Wilkens Medical Group with clinics in Williamsburg, KY and Jellico TN, was awarded the 2022 Kentucky Rural Health



Kentucky EMS Provider of the Year Award

The annual award recognizes an EMS provider who works or volunteers at a rural Kentucky EMS service and who demonstrates exemplary pre-hospital patient care and dedication to his/her community. The award is presented during National EMS Week.

Jim Thomas of Marion County EMS was named the 2022 Rural Kentucky EMS Provider of the Year. The annual award recognizes someone who works or volunteers at a rural Kentucky EMS service and who demonstrates exemplary prehospital patient care and dedication to their community.

One nominator wrote of Jim: "He is absolutely dedicated to his community. He wants nothing more than to serve his community to the best of his ability. ... Little known fact [about Jim] he doesn't tell most people, but he follows up every time with the family or the patient after every single run to check their progress in recovery. This is huge in EMS because, typically, once we turn over care, we don't know our patients' outcome unless we know the patient personally."





KORH in the Community

Through the provision of direct and indirect technical assistance, the coordination of rural health resources, and the dissemination of rural relevant information, KORH is continually engaged with the community in every aspect of its work.

The mission of KORH is to support the health and well-being of Kentuckians by promoting access to rural health services. KORH works directly with clinicians, clinic and hospital administrators, policymakers and other stakeholders to improve the accessibility of health care services for the Commonwealth's rural and underserved residents. The office connects communities and health care organizations to local, state and federal resources while working toward long-term solutions to financial, quality improvement and workforce challenges.

Information Dissemination

The KORH Weekly Update, a weekly e-newsletter that contains rural health news, announcements, educational offerings, and funding opportunities, is released each Monday morning.

The Bridge, a quarterly publication that highlights best practices and innovative solutions to Kentucky's rural health challenges, debuted in January 2015. Each issue spotlights the programs and individuals that exemplify innovation or excellence across the Commonwealth. The magazine—which is distributed in both print and electronic forms—is a collaboration between the UK Center of Excellence in Rural Health and KORH.

2023 Outlook

KORH continues to develop programmatic activities based on the needs of rural stakeholders within the guidelines of funders. The goal of maintaining adequate funding for KORH programs amidst the changing political environment remains an area of constant focus. KORH continues to explore additional opportunities in order to effectively broaden programming while remaining true to the original mission and purpose.

Funding for the program is a joint collaboration of the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services, University of Kentucky, and UK Center of Excellence in Rural Health.

Kentucky Homeplace is recognized at the national, state and local levels as a Community Health Worker (CHW) model that works. Residents of rural Kentucky have unusually high levels of certain diseases,



including cancer, heart disease, hypertension, asthma, and diabetes. Lifestyle choices, environmental factors, inadequate health insurance and general lack of understanding of the healthcare system are often cited as contributing factors. To help address these issues, Kentucky Homeplace began in 1994 as a demonstration project in 14 Appalachian counties. After more than two decades, Kentucky Homeplace CHWs have linked tens of thousands of rural Kentuckians with medical, social, and environmental services they otherwise may have gone without. Today the Kentucky Homeplace geographic service area includes 30 Appalachian counties in eastern Kentucky. Eligibility for Kentucky Homeplace is not based on income, though nearly all clients are between 100% - 133% of the federal poverty level. All services are offered at no charge to the clients.

Mission

The mission of Kentucky Homeplace is to provide access to medical, social, and environmental services for the citizens of the Commonwealth.


Vision & Goals

KY Homeplace - Client Encounter

As most people have noticed electric bills across Kentucky are at a high. This especially brings hardship to our elderly/fixed income clients. I had a client to call me in tears. She said she just received her electric bill and it was over \$850.00 for one month. She has about a 1200 square foot home and she said there just was no way she could ever pay that and be able to purchase her medication for the month or food. I had her gather all documents needed and I picked them up off of her porch on my way to the post office since she is unable to drive and had no fax machine and didn't know how to do it on her phone. I then made copies and took them to the LIHEAP office across the hall from my office. At this time there had been a transition of workers at that office and no one really knew what to do to help and here it was in the crisis time for them. I contacted the main office and spoke with a worker there, she asked me to scan everything to her and she would take care of it. So this is what I did. Always before this client was over the income guidelines for ever getting help, but due to the Crisis guidelines she qualified and was gifted \$650 off of her monthly electric bill and I was told to get a copy of her water bill and she could get that paid as well. All of this was done and when I called the client to let her know what all was going to happen, she simply just sat there in silence. I asked a few times ma'am, are you there, are you ok? She just took a few deep breathes and said, this has saved her life this month. She said she didn't know how to repay me and I told her no worries this was my job and we didn't want anything in return, I was just glad we could help her. She called back several times that month just thanking me for being so kind and taking the time out to research help for her and her need.

Appalachian Community Health Days

The UK Center of Excellence in Rural Health received a grant award entitled "Increasing the COVID -19 Vaccination Rates in Rural Appalachia Kentucky". It is supported by the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). As a result of this award, Kentucky Homeplace Community Health Workers are partnering with the UK Center of Excellence in Rural Health and USA Drone Port to host Appalachian Community Health Days. The mission is to intensify efforts at the local level to increase COVID-19 vaccination rates in their service area. Dr. Fran Feltner, DNP, director of the UK CERH and principal investigator of

Kentucky Homeplace said "Leveraging the expertise of community health workers and our many valued community partners, our intent is to meet people where they are to work through barriers, alleviate fears, dispel myths, educate and assess any needs people may have that could be holding them back from being vaccinated." The chart shows services provided to individuals through September 30, 2021. The work has been presented at webinars hosted by the National Rural Health Association, Kentucky Cabinet for Health & Family Services, and the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services Office of Minority Health.

Community-Based Programs

Community health workers are trained to facilitate community-based health education and coaching workshops to assist people with chronic illness to achieve improvements in nutrition, medication use, exercise, communication, decision-making and more.

2023 Outlook

Kentucky Homeplace will continue efforts to obtain sustainable funding in order to meet their mission to provide access to medical, social, and environmental services for the citizens of the Commonwealth. CHWs will continue to provide education, coaching, and services with the goal of improving the health of their clients. Kentucky Homeplace was awarded additional funding from the CDC to improve health equity and vaccine confidence through the KY Health Equity Grant & Community Health Worker Model Expansion grant. This allowed the program to expand and hire 10 additional community health workers.



The Healthcare Worker Loan Relief Program of the Commonwealth

The Healthcare Worker Loan Relief Program of the Commonwealth (HWLRPC), administered by UK CERH, is a new funding opportunity designed to increase the recruitment and retention of healthcare professionals practicing in underserved areas of Kentucky. Participants in the program are required to work 24-40 hours a week, up to 4,160 hours over a two to three year period.

The foundation of the HWLRPC was established during the 2022 convening of the Kentucky General Assembly as HB 573, sponsored by Rep. Kimberly Moser. The program was created to align with the existing federally funded state loan repayment program and expand eligibility to additional healthcare specialists. HWLRPC is geared toward trained and licensed professionals who provide direct patient care in one of the program's eligible disciplines and specialties, including physicians, optometrists, ophthalmologists, audiologists, physician assistants, nurse practitioners, certified nurse-midwives, registered nurses, dentists, registered dental hygienists, licensed clinical social workers, licensed professional clinical counselors, health service psychologists, marriage and family therapists, psychiatric nurse specialists, alcohol and substance use disorder counselors, pharmacists and additional specialties are considered.

The first application cycle opened up in October of 2022 and closed in November of 2022. The first group of healthcare professionals will be announced in January of 2023.


The Bridge targets health care providers, educators, researchers, leaders, community members and others who work in the rural health care arena or have interest in rural health issues, innovations and best practices.



The July flooding had a large impact on NFVCHC, June Buchanan Clinic, and their communities of





Expected Job Growth

The Bureau of Labor Statistics projects employment of physical therapists to grow 21 percent from 2020 to 2030, much faster than the average for all occupations. Demand for physical therapy services will come from the aging baby boomers, who are staying more active later in life. In addition, physical therapists will be needed to treat people with mobility issues stemming from chronic conditions, such as diabetes or obesity. Expected Job Growth

Overall employment of social workers is projected to grow 12 percent from 2020 to 2030. Increased demand for healthcare and social services will drive demand for social workers, but growth will vary by specialization. From 2020 to 2030, employment of child, family, and school social workers is projected to grow 13 percent; employment of healthcare social workers is projected to grow 13 percent; and employment of mental health and substance abuse social workers is projected to grow 15 percent. 





Community Engagement and Research Core

The Community Engagement and Research Core connects community, clinical, and academic partners in community-engaged research to address priority health needs and improve health outcomes in Kentucky and Appalachia.

The Community Engagement and Research program is supported by a central office at UK and two Rural Research Hubs located within the UK Center of Excellence in Rural Health (Hazard, KY) and St. Claire Regional Medical Center (Morehead, KY). Both Rural Research Hubs are located in Appalachian Kentucky and are staffed with a clinical faculty liaison and a research study coordinator.

Services from the Community Engagement and Research Core include:

- Study coordination support from either or both of the two CCTS Rural Research Hubs (Hazard or Morehead).
- Research consultation on community engaged grant applications, project implementation, and/or research dissemination.
- Identification of collaborative partnerships with community organization, practice based research networks.
- Identification of collaborative opportunities within the Appalachian Translational Research Network and the Western States Consortium.



Kentucky Appalachian Rural Rehabilitation Network

The Kentucky Appalachian Rural Rehabilitation Network (KARRN) is a statewide network of people with spinal cord injury (SCI), stroke, and brain injury (TBI), healthcare providers, educators, researchers, and other community members committed to the health and well-being of people with neurological impairments who live in the Appalachian region. The KARRN network continually engages community members and conducts research in the areas of SCI, TBI and stroke. Each year, the network holds an annual conference, which provides CEUs for physicians, nurses, social workers, physical therapists, occupational therapists, and speech therapists. In addition, KARRN helps to provide assistance with the Kentucky Congress on Spinal Cord Injury Conference.

In 2022, KARRN was awarded an extension for the Commonwealth Council on Developmental Disabilities grant to expand Project CARAT, and the continuation of the CARAT-TOP (Together One Priority) Program. KAARN also managed the Grace Jones Memorial Fund. The grant committee received 11 applications, of which 4 applications were funded, for a total of approximately \$4,000. In addition, KARRN completed 2 cohorts of high school students, with the CRAAT-TOP program, for a total of 30 students. Toys with a Purpose, a toy lending library was also established. The Appalachian Center for Assistive Technology (ACAT) was created at the UK Center of Excellence in Rural health, as part of the KATS Network. ACAT will be the new Assistive Technology Resource Center (ATRC) for the region. The center includes a maker space, lending library, workforce training, and education. KARRN also completed the disabilities bias survey, and a manuscript is, currently, being written.

The UK CERH is a long-standing partner of the network. Under the umbrella of KARRN are Project CARAT (Coordinating and Assisting the Reuse of Assistive Technology).






Project CARAT

Project CARAT is a community outreach, service learning program that aims to make assistive technology and durable medical equipment (DME) more accessible to those who need it in underserved areas of Kentucky. The UK Center of Excellence in Rural Health and Carl D. Perkins Center were the original sites for Project CARAT. The UK CERH site is unique in that it is a service learning program and ran by Physical Therapy students. Students are trained to clean and refurbish DME to distribute to those in need. Project CARAT has several locations across Kentucky and is now overseen by the Kentucky Assistive Technology Service Network (KATS).

In 2022, Project CARAT was part of the Commonwealth Council on Developmental Disabilities grant. This grant allowed Project CARAT to expand the program and help establish a toy lending library. There were 16 DPT students trained within the program. Project CARAT also continues to have two satellite sites, with the UK CERH being the main hub. These two sites are in partnership with Kentucky Homeplace and are located in Harlan, and Rowan Counties.

Coordinating and Assisting the Reuse of Assistive Technology— Together One Priority (CARAT-TOP)

CARAT-TOP includes a eight-week service learning program that brings together students, of all abilities, from local high schools and the community to develop skills in assessing community accessibility, refurbishing used medical equipment, adapting toys and other assistive technology

devices, prototype new parts, and develop strategies for engaging community stakeholders (leaders, businesses, faith communities, local media, etc.). As part of this program participants will work on an overall project that will be presented to the Community Advisory Committee and other community members. In addition to the service learning program, CARAT-TOP includes three additional programs: Project CARAT refurbishing and reutilization program, Toys with a Purpose: Adapted Toy Lending Library, and a workforce development internship/apprenticeship program.



In 2022, two cohorts of high school students completed the program, with

31 students in total. In the Spring semester, 16 students from Perry County Central High School completed CARAT-TOP. These students adapted the Perry County Park to make it more accessible for everyone. They were divided into four groups, with each group adapting a portion of the park. The portions of the park the groups focused on, were as follows: pool area, picnic shelter, playground, and miniature golf. A certificate of completion ceremony was held for this cohort, in May 2022.

In December 2022, the second cohort of students at Perry County Central High School, completed the program. This cohort consisted of 15 students. The project they chose was to adapt toys. Students were split into five groups and each group chose two toys to adapt. Once the toys are completed and adapted, they will present them to a local elementary school, West Perry Elementary.

Community Health Worker Career Pathway for High School Students

United Healthcare (UHC) and the UK Center of Excellence in Rural Health announced a gift to support the first-ever Students Striving Toward Better Health in Self and Community initiative, available to Perry County and Hazard Independent high school students.

High school students enrolling in the program receive tuition-free college education and training toward community health worker certification. UK CERH leads the development, coordination, and execution of content and programming with UHC providing expertise and support resources. The community health worker curriculum is based on the Kentucky Homeplace training model and is built upon Kentucky Homeplace's 28-years of community health worker experience. Classes are conducted onsite at Hazard Community and Technical College with remote learning available when needed.

This pilot program presents a unique partnership that demonstrates how private businesses, higher education, and communities can partner to address rural health needs. The gift for \$35,000 will cover costs for 23 students, include a virtual mentor internship by United Healthcare and a paid apprenticeship for the students.

In 2021, the training program graduated seven students. In July 2022, the seven students completed their 80-hour shadowing apprenticeship at the Center of Excellence in Rural Health making them eligible for State Certification as a Community Health Worker. Four students graduated the program in December 2022 and will begin their shadowing apprenticeship in Spring 2023.







Kentucky River Health Consortium

The mission of the Consortium is to use the collective expertise and resources of our local agencies to address the health burdens in the Kentucky River counties of Breathitt, Knott, Letcher, Leslie, Lee, Owsley, Perry, and Wolfe.



The Center initiated the development of the consortium and continues to take a leading role in moving the group forward.

The Consortium has three workgroups to look at health and wellbeing issues within these specific populations. The workgroup's focus populations are youth, aging and substance use disorder. The overall consortium serves as a resource to the workgroups by offering a place for them to share ideas, promote projects in the community and look for additional resources when needed. With the flooding in July a mental health workgroup was established in a effort to ensure these impacted by the flooding had a access to mental health



services. This group is now a standing workgroup of the consortium. This workgroup also includes agencies from the Big Sandy counties and we have started discussions on how to best expand the work of our current consortium to include their region.

Through the efforts of our workgroups and partners we were able to host and participate in several events in 2022.

The Kentucky River District Health Department and the substance use disorder workgroup have create the HUB in Lee County, Kentucky which is a one-stop location for those with SUD issues, those in recovery and family members of those impacted by SUD. The HUB provides office space for numerous agencies to provide needed services for Lee and surrounding counties. These partners have also collaborated and applied for grant funding to enhance and increase the services being provide. This site serves as a pilot and will be a model for the creation of HUBs in other counties.

The consortium members partnered to conduct a door to door needs assessment with flood impacted communities. With volunteers from the consortium and outside we were able to reach over 100 families to collect information regarding immediate needs (food, water, medical supplies) and longer term needs (debris removal, help with home repairs, etc.). Information collected was shared with local Kentucky Homeplace CHWs for follow up. Long term needs were also shared with each counties long-term recovery groups for additional assistance.



Kentucky River Health Consortium

The Youth Workgroup hosted an event on December 9th at AB Combs for the staff and students of Robinson Elementary and Buckhorn Elementary and Buckhorn High schools. These two Perry County schools were destroyed by the July flooding . The event called "I'm Worth It- Protective Factors for all" was to acknowledge the trauma experienced by students and staff of these schools after the catastrophic flood, explore how traumatic events impact one's life, and to build protective factors which allow one to withstand trauma. The Center was a leading partner in the event and four of our DPT students assisted with classroom activities.



The faculty and staff of each school were provided appetizers, snacks and coffee.

Students were able to process their experiences, have meaningful conversations about how to take care of themselves, and practice the skills they learned to apply in their daily lives.

Appalachian Community Health Days

The University of Kentucky Center of Excellence in Rural Health, Kentucky Homeplace, USA Drone Port and a network of community partners joined forces to intensify efforts at the local level to increase COVID-19 vaccination rates in a 32-county

region of Appalachia Kentucky and neighboring counties in West Virginia, with \$3.3 million in grant funding from the U.S. Health Resources Services Administration.

The goal is to improve COVID-19 vaccination rates in Appalachian communities by:

- Increasing community outreach in remote communities.
- Removing barriers to vaccine access.
- Assessing needs of individuals.
- Provide education.
- Increasing positive messaging.



A series of more than 90 Community Health Days are to be held across the region beginning in August 2021 and with continuations will go through May 2023. The activities focus on removing as many barriers as possible and reaching as many individuals as possible in our more rural and underserved communities.

Since August, 2021 this grant has enabled us to provide over 90 events in local communities allowing us to provide COVID-19 education, vaccinations and health screenings. At the end of 2022 the funding had allowed us to conduct 2,294 health screenings, reach over 3 million individuals through digital media, and provide access for 1,231 individuals to receive a COVID vaccination. We will continue to host events in our communities and broaden our efforts to engage children and their families through the remainder of the grant funding.
